Our History and Mission

"To advocate for and provide the resources, skills, and shelter to alleviate abuse through prevention and intervention for all children and their families."

Manatee Children's Services was founded in 1977 by Carol Chamberlain: a librarian, teacher, and social worker with a passion for child advocacy. Through her work in social services, Carol learned that Manatee County had a dire need for shelter to house abused children removed from their homes. She rallied a group of citizens to make the shelter a reality and, to this day, MCS continues to operate as Manatee County's only emergency shelter for child victims of abuse and the county's only Child Advocacy Center.

We provide a full spectrum of programs serving over 12,000 children and families annually. We offer programs in treatment, prevention, intervention, and residential services. Such programs include an emergency shelter, long-term group homes, mental health services, parenting education and training, forensic medical and specialized child victim interview services, support services for relative caregivers, teen pregnancy prevention, and children's personal safety. 


Welcome to our team

Adrienne Bookhamer

Lakewood Ranch Community Foundation

Adrienne Bookhamer, Executive Director of the Lakewood Ranch Community Foundation, has been instrumental in our community's efforts to help nonprofits. She is especially passionate about children and families after spending the majority of her career in child welfare and adoption in both Denver and Tampa prior to her role as CEO of the Foundation. Adrienne stated she particularly fell in love with helping older children get out of child welfare and into a place of permanency.

The Lakewood Ranch Community Foundation plays a vital role in championing a community that benefits all through its support of lifechanging nonprofits and causes across the area. Originally created as the Lakewood Ranch Community Fund in 2000 by Schroeder-Manatee Ranch, (the original developer of Lakewood Ranch), it supports people and interests through generous donor contributions that serve Lakewood Ranch and East Manatee County. The Foundation received its 501(C)(3) status in 2021 after working closely with the Manatee Community Foundation to achieve its mission. Since its inception, it has granted over \$1.5 million to over 140 nonprofits that are directly making an impact in our community. The Foundation has supported MCS programs with recognition and grant funding for several years, particularly through our Grandparents as Parents kinship caregiver program.

"Caregiving is hard, especially when families are dealing with much more than just taking care of children," Adrienne said. "They are dealing with trauma and emotional difficulties, making it much more difficult to keep children with their families. Seeing what I did while working in social services, this is an issue very near and dear to my heart."



MCS REFLECTS ON BLACK HISTORY MONTH



February is Black History Month and an important time for social workers, as many pioneers in Black History paved the way for the rights of underserved populations and have deeply influenced social work as we know it today. MCS staff shared some of the icons who have inspired them the most:

As a former science teacher, I admire the innovation and genius of George Washington Carver. He was also known for being a man for the people. He was born into slavery and could have been quite wealthy through his career but chose to give back by donating his life savings of \$60,000 (about \$1 million by today's standards) to a museum and foundation in his name.

Well-behaved women rarely make history, which is why Rosa Parks is my inspiration. She sacrificed her job and reputation to take a stand against racial segregation. Sometimes we need to make some noise to get things done, which is exactly what she did.

Ida B. Wells. She was born an enslaved woman and grew up to become one of the best known journalists in U.S. history and a leader in anti-lynching.

I see Laila Ameria Ali, retired undefeated female boxer and daughter of Muhammed Ali, as an icon because I too was a fighter when I was in middle school. It was not until I read about her career in boxing that I decided fighting for free is not going to get me anywhere in life. She motivated me to be mindful of my attitude, actions, and behaviors.

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
